

### 2020: 100 Years of Growing

Dear Supporters & Friends,

Lynchburg Grows looks much different than it did one year ago. The most monumental additions are four new greenhouses and a new open-air pavilion (The Education Station). The new greenhouses' first growing season is underway and the Education Station will play host to outdoor nutrition classes and volunteer meetings beginning this spring! While the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted

some of the usual farm business in 2020, we adapted, continued to grow, and now plan for more innovation in 2021.

In early spring, when the reality of the pandemic set in, we were unsure if we could continue our CSA program. While we waited out the first month of uncertainty, we donated our entire harvest to local families in need. To keep our at-risk employees safe, we sent them home. Soon, it became clear that fresh produce was going to be in even greater need than usual as stock ran low at grocery stores. With the hard work of our staff and your support, we responded to this need by setting up a drive-through CSA and increasing our CSA subscription base by more than 50%. In these ways, and with your help, Lynchburg Grows continued to provide access to quality produce during a challenging year.

Our farmers with disabilities have had to remain on the sidelines during the pandemic, but we've continued to meet with them as much as possible, including special visits during holidays like Halloween and Valentine's Day. As we welcome them back in 2021, we are launching a new Farm Coach program, where experienced farmers will work one-on-one with our farmers with disabilities. This program will allow close mentorship directed at

improving their farming skills. We remain committed to empowering individuals with disabilities to work toward new goals.

Finally, it's important to mark milestones. 2020 was the 100th year of growing on the land where Lynchburg Grows is located. It began with cut flowers and roses and now the farm is devoted to producing good food. 100 years on, Lynchburg Grows continues to serve the community, and for that, we want to thank you, our gracious supporters. We could not do this without your generosity.

### The Food We Grow


Just as the spring growing season was getting into full swing in late March, COVID-19 arrived. We had to reduce our staff from 12 to 5 people and to greatly restrict the number of volunteers allowed on the farm. At the same time, there was a surge in interest in procuring locally-produced food, along with a surge in food insecurity, as many families lost sources of income to the pandemic restrictions.

Clearly, our community needed us to grow as much food as we could. We are proud to report that we adapted and responded, producing a total of

# 47,296 servings

of produce that we distributed through the Veggie Box CSA program, the Farm Store, and donations to a variety of local organizations that work to feed the hungry.

Of course, this isn't just any food. This is fresh, nutritious, beautiful produce that everyone needs and deserves. We grow it with all organic methods and lots of love and we are so happy to share it with you.





### **Food Donations**

To help meet the needs of our community during this difficult time, we placed a special emphasis on food donations during 2020. We harvested, processed, and donated every week for a total of

### 18,354 servings

of food to organizations that include:

Since the founding of Lynchburg Grows, our friends from St. John's Episcopal Church have managed one greenhouse at the farm and devoted all of the food harvested from it to this donation effort. We are so grateful for their ongoing commitment to getting healthy food to as many people as we can!

# The Veggie Box CSA

When concerns about our food supply chain made the news in mid-March, interest in joining our CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) program soared. Clearly, we needed to push ourselves to accommodate as many families as we could. After some thought and analysis, we got to work and expanded from 115 families served in 2019 to

### 200 families served

in 2020. The Veggie Box CSA program provides members with 6 items to take home each week (or every other week for half-shares). Members choose from a selection of 14 or 15 items that we grow or that are produced by other local farmers. The 2020 season ran from April into December.

When the season began, we adapted to COVID-19 restrictions by creating our first-ever Drive-Thru CSA, then transitioned to pick-up days in the Packing Shed with lots of ventilation, masks and hand sanitizer required, and a limit of two customers inside at a time. Thanks to our wonderful members, the whole season ran smoothly!

The pandemic inspired people across the nation to source their food locally and/or grow their own. A stronger local food system is one bright spot in an otherwise difficult year and we hope this interest keeps growing well into the future.



Two weeks after the lockdown last spring, we opened the CSA on schedule as a Drive-Thru with pre-packaged shares.



Later, as we had more information on how to operate safely, we moved back into the Packing Shed, with open windows and doors.



### Volunteers

In normal times, we regularly have large groups of volunteers from colleges, high schools, and churches come to the farm to help us get big jobs done quickly. But due to restrictions in 2020, we had to largely rely on a small group of regular volunteers. They rose to the occasion and came more often, sometimes four days a week. All-told, farm volunteers logged a total of

# 3,875 hours

and helped us accomplish an amazing amount of work this year!

We thank the St. John's volunteers, the supporters who came out for the few group day volunteer events we held to help with big projects, and especially our Super Volunteers, who did so much to keep the farm going in a crazy year. It is not lost on us how lucky we are to call these kind, generous, and dedicated people part of our farm family here at Lynchburg Grows.

Chris Naisawald joined us in 2020 after a recent retirement and has become a regular and essential member of the crew.

# The Capital Campaign

The Capital Campaign is a three-year endeavor to complete a list of projects that are critical to our objectives of expanding production capacity, sustainability, and community outreach and impact through a renewed focus on farm-based education. The Campaign relies on single donations and three-year pledges from individuals and businesses in the community.

We now have 5,280 square feet more production area for growing food! Our biggest project in 2020 was the construction of two new production greenhouses and two smaller greenhouses devoted to seed-starting.
